

Remembering Service and Sacrifice in Vietnam

Back in March, it was a sunny but chilly day atop the hill in Reading where the city's Vietnam Memorial sits when I joined with area veterans to remember, solemnly, 50-years since the end of the conflict.

There were smiles of seeing old friends, and sorrow remembering those who did not make it home. This is why I authored and passed a law requiring every state-owned property in Pennsylvania to fly the POW/MIA banner along with the Stars and Stripes and the state flag.

According to **USAFacts.org**, as recent as 2022, there are roughly 231,500 veterans in Pennsylvania who served during the Vietnam War. Pennsylvania has the third highest number of veterans among the 50 states.



Property Tax Relief Update

No doubt many residents of the 130th Legislative District recall voting to adopt an amendment to Pennsylvania's constitution that allows up to 100% of a home-or farmstead's value to be excluded from real estate taxation.

I was pleased to have authored and shepherded this constitutional amendment through the legislative process, and I have continued to advocate for enabling legislation to implement it for real property tax relief.

During the current legislative session, House Democrats have used parliamentary maneuvers to block numerous amendments that would create an exclusion to reduce real estate taxes by as much as \$1,000 for homeowners and farmstead owners. While not the total property tax elimination I would ultimately like to see, these proposals would be a step in the right direction by providing real relief, and it is disappointing to see all House Democrats vote to prevent them from moving forward despite full Republican support.

Election Integrity

It is vitally important that our citizens have confidence that all votes counted in elections were fairly cast by individuals in Pennsylvania who are eligible to vote, and I have proposed legislation to do just that.

My legislation is very simple and pragmatic – it will require that when registering to vote a person demonstrate they are a U.S. citizen before their registration is considered complete. To make this process simple for individuals registering to vote, I made certain the legislation details the large number of ways a potential voter may demonstrate citizenship.

To ensure federal law is adhered to — which is that only U.S. citizens may vote in federal, state or local elections — my legislation requires copies of birth certificates

for those seeking to register to vote be provided at no cost to potential voters.

The right to vote is a gift preserved for us by sweat and blood of generations before. We must also shoulder that yoke as freedom is not to be taken for granted. It must be quarded.



SCHOOL DISTRICT FUNDING

The school funding numbers for 2024-25 in Pennsylvania have been released. These are the funding increases for all the school districts in the 130th Legislative District are as follows:

First Responders Recognition Day is Sept. 27

My law declaring Sept. 27 as *First Responders Recognition Day in Pennsylvania*, *Act 87 of 2021*, directs the governor each year to issue "a proclamation calling upon all public schools and educational institutions to observe *"First Responders Recognition Day"* and to conduct exercises recognizing the contributions and remembering the sacrifices that first responders have made."

So far, no governor has seen fit to issue such a proclamation, so I am calling on us to do so.

Some 97% of Pennsylvanians rely on volunteers for fire protection of their homes. And let us remember that our military is also comprised of all volunteers. To volunteer one's time and service to a goal bigger than any of us is a huge thing to ask, and to give.

Several years ago, I invited Mark Malizzi, a local first responder chaplain, to give the opening prayer for the House of Representatives and he inspired me to think about how we could honor these men and women. We should absolutely have a day set aside each year to remember what they do with a celebration in our communities, and we don't need a governor to say it is "okay."

Citizen of the Year

The Boyertown's Citizen of the Year 2024 honor goes to Kenneth Hunt.

Ken's deep belief in community and service to his neighbors has driven him to dedicate the last 20-plus years of his life to serving others in the Boyertown area.

Hunt has been the executive director at United Way of Boyertown Area since 2005. He has also served as the coleader of the Boyertown Area Homelessness Task Force, secretary of the Berks-Mont Business Association and a member of the BMBA Philadelphia Avenue Street Fair Committee. He has served as a free AARP tax preparer, delivered Meals on Wheels and tutored youth.

The Citizen of the Year Committee also recognized Jeff Shontz, owner of Bear's Den Fitness, as Mentor of the Year; Boyertown Ambulance EMS Chief James Boyer as First Responder of the Year; and Boyertown student Samantha Jo Dolansky as Outstanding Senior of the Year.

The Boyertown Area Historical Society earned this year's Special Recognition Award as a local non-profit that has gone "above and beyond" for the community.



Hands-on with PA's Natural Resources

One of the benefits of living where we do are the numerous clear, cool streams running through this part of Berks County, which support a healthy population of trout. This season the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission stocked approximately 3.2 million adult trout in 697 streams and 129 lakes open to public angling. I participated in numerous stockings in Berks County and all across the state.

The adult trout stocking schedule can be found at **fishandboat.com** and is searchable by county; lists the waterways in alphabetical order; and indicates stocking dates, meeting locations for volunteers and the species of trout that will be stocked at each location.

As the House Game and Fisheries Committee chairman, I was recently invited by the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) to tour Blue Marsh Lake and its facilities.

My grandsons and I were treated to the unique experience of riding around the lake with waterways conservation officers (WCOs) in one of the PFBC's new Boston Whaler Guardian 210 law enforcement boats. It is a very impressive machine.

Previously, the conservation officers used an aging Grady White, but that is really a fishing boat, and the deck layout was not suitable for repeated boardings throughout the day and the navigation electronics were quite old.





Oley Field Hockey Star Goes International

After four standout seasons on the Oley Valley High School Field Hockey Team, Phia Gladieux, now attending Penn State University, was named to the Olympic team earlier this year.

In their second pool game of the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, the No. 13 U.S. Olympic Women's Field Hockey Team met No. 7 Spain. The second quarter ended deadlocked at 1-1.




BEAR CUBS STATE CHAMPS!

The Bear Cubs completed a dominant undefeated run through the 2024 Junior Legion State Tournament to earn the title of State Champs for the 15th time in team history! They outscored their opponents a combined 61-11 in the tournament and haven't lost a game since the second round of the Berks League Playoffs.

The championship game featured a rematch against Hamburg the fourth time the two teams faced each other in 2024. The Cubs scored first, converting three straight singles to lead off the bottom of the first (Costello, Artim and Reinert) into two runs (2 RBI for Reinert). Hamburg responded by scoring two in the top of the second to tie the game at two.

The Cubs repeated their first inning magic in the bottom of the third with one-out singles from Costello and Artim



followed by a two-RBI double by Reinert to put Boyertown up 4-2. These turned out to be the winning runs, as the Cubs would never trail again, on their way to a 7-2 victory and the state championship.
